

Up in the hills of the Peak District

It is no surprise that Buxton is one of the most popular tourist destinations in the Peak District. Its famous Georgian and Victorian architecture provide an impressive backdrop to a vibrant range of festivals, theatre and music. Add

to this the natural wonders of its thermal waters and Poole's Cavern, the views from Grin Low Country Park, the stunning ornamental Pavilion Gardens, a wealth of independent and high street shops and a wide choice of cafés, pubs, bars and restaurants to tempt your taste buds. There's no need to compromise with a visit to Buxton.

### Refresh & Revitalise

Buxton is a great place to recharge and escape from the hectic, busyness of life. We have refreshing spas, woodlands to wander through and beautiful spaces to relax in.

### **Beyond Buxton**

In the heart of the Peak District, Buxton is a great base for exploring the National Park and we're within easy reach of Chatsworth House, Haddon Hall, Crich Tramway Museum, Alton Towers, Peak Wildlife Park and several National Trust properties. Nearby beauty spots include the Goyt Valley, Mam Tor and the Great Ridge, the Roaches, Ladybower Reservoir, Dove Dale Nature Reserve and the Monsal Trail.

### **Steeped in History**

Famed for its thermal spring waters, our town has attracted people for centuries. The Romans named it Aquae Arnemetiae or 'Waters of the Goddess of the Grove'. The fifth Duke of Devonshire put Buxton on the map with the building of the Georgian Crescent in the 1780s, now reopen as a 5-star health spa hotel. Royal prisoners, outlaws and noble benefactors are also part of the town's rich history. Explore Buxton Museum & Art Gallery (p33) to find out more, the Crescent Heritage Experience (p35) or take a tour with Discover Buxton Tours (p31).

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### **Iconic Architecture**

Buxton is home to the 'Theatre in the Hills', Frank Matcham's Buxton Opera House, and the adjacent historic Winter Gardens conservatory which links to the main Pavilion Gardens complex. This houses the Pavilion Kitchen, Tea Rooms, Retail Arcade, Ice Cream Parlour and the Gallery in the Gardens. Fairs and markets are held in the grand Octagon Hall and brass bands play on the bandstand on Sunday afternoons during the summer months. The venue also includes the Pavilion Arts Centre which hosts Buxton Cinema (p30) and a variety of arts events throughout the year.

The Pavilion Gardens (p31) themselves, 23 acres of award-winning, ornamental gardens designed by Joseph Paxton and Edward Milner, which have recently celebrated their 150th anniversary, include serpentine walkways, children's play areas, a boating lake and a miniature railway.

Buxton is also home to the magnificent Devonshire Dome, once the world's largest unsupported dome, where you'll find the awardwinning Devonshire Spa.

To find more of Buxton's gems, follow the Heritage Trail (p36-38) or, if you'd like to see the town's attractions from another vantage point, take a ride on the 'Wonder of the Peak' tram (p31).

# Explore – Adventure for Everyone

From artistic and cultural pursuits to the extremes of physical adventure. there is always something new to try at any time of year. A huge range of outdoor activities - including golf, climbing, abseiling, canoeing, caving, cycling and walking - is here for you. And there's no need to worry about the weather. The town has so much to offer come sun, rain or even snow! Buxton is also the start and end of the 190 mile Peak District Boundary Walk. But you don't need to go far for an adventure. Visit Poole's Cavern showcave (p32), follow the Ring of Trees, find Solomon's Temple, Corbar Cross or, for those seeking high thrills, visit the aerial walkways of Go Ape!

### Arts, Music & Festivals

Buxton is justifiably proud of its cultural life and you'll find much to suit all tastes. Be inspired by the Buxton International Festival (p30) and Festival Fringe, our Well Dressing Festival & Carnival and the International Gilbert & Sullivan Festival (p30).

Live music can be found most nights of the year with special annual events including the Buxton Military Tattoo, Buxton's Day of Dance, Eat in the Park festival and the Buxton Brass Band Competition.

Don't forget the wonderfully varied programme at Buxton Opera House (p30). Theatre, music, comedy, dance and opera are all well represented and there are talks and children's events throughout the year.



Local artists showcase their work at The Gallery in the Gardens, The Green Man Gallery (p21) and at regular art and designer fairs at the Pavilion Gardens (p31). Buxton Museum & Art Gallery (p33) also hosts year-round art exhibitions and there are plenty of opportunities for the creative person to become involved in community workshops and events.

### Markets, Fairs & Auctions

A variety of markets, fairs and auctions take place throughout the year. The Pavilion Gardens (p31) hosts more than 100 events featuring antiques, books, art, crafts, toys, food, jewellery and classic cars. Every Tuesday and Saturday, a traditional market (p48) is held in Higher Buxton at 1032 feet above sea level, making us the highest market town in England. There are various seasonal shopping events and spring brings the May Day bank holiday when Buxton hosts an array of its finest entertainment and local stalls showcasing the best the town has to offer.

## of Buxton's heritage

Take a stroll from the magnificent Georgian Crescent and Pump Room up the Slopes, past the Town Hall to the highest Market Place in England. Then wind back down through the delightful Pavilion Gardens towards the Opera House, the Dome and the imposing Palace Hotel, taking in the Octagon, Pavilion and other captivating features en route. This is a truly impressive trail around the architectural gems that make Buxton what it is.

Guided heritage tours by experienced local guides are available with Discover Buxton Tours (p31).

Locations plotted on centre page map A to S

A The Crescent was built by the fifth Duke of Devonshire in the 1780s to provide accommodation for visitors attracted to the town by the healthgiving waters. Designed by John Carr to rival the Royal Crescent at Bath, it was a Georgian 'leisure centre' with two hotels, apartments, shops, coffee and card rooms and a magnificent Assembly Room, This Grade I-listed building has been restored to its former glory and reopened in 2020 as an 80-bedroom 5-star hotel and spa. Some ground floor and basement rooms are open as part of the Buxton Crescent Heritage Experience (p35).

The Natural Baths, to the left of the Crescent, on the site of the original Roman Bath, were built between 1851 and 1854. They too have been restored and form the centre piece of a health and wellness spa.

Presented to the town in 1940, the prominent St Ann's Well is constantly

fed with thermal spring water at a temperature of 27.5  $^{\circ}\mathrm{C}$  and stands next to the Pump Room.

The Pump Room was built in 1894 by Henry Currey as an addition to the 'water treatments' of the time. In use until 1981, it is now open as the Buxton Visitor Centre.

To the right of the Crescent is the Cavendish Arcade. Originally designed as a thermal bath in 1854, it now serves as a speciality shopping arcade (p20). It features an original plunge bath and the interior still has most of its Minton tiling and a striking glass barrel vaulted ceiling by Brian Clarke.

By the Cavendish Arcade is Turner's Memorial, erected in 1879 at a cost of £224 in memory of a local benefactor Samuel Turner. It was restored and relocated in 1994 following damage due to a car crash.

- The Miltons Tap (p14) dates from the early 1800s and is one of the oldest buildings in the Spring Gardens area. Previously known as The Cherry Tree, it is named after the 17th century poet, John Milton, best known for his epic poem Paradise Lost.
- C At the entrance to Spring Gardens is The Children's Well. Made of pink granite, it was presented to the town in 1886.
- D The Slopes, rising in front of the Crescent, were designed by Sir Jeffry Wyatville in 1818 and modified by Joseph Paxton in 1840. If you follow the paths through the trees you will notice that, together with the Crescent, they form a complete circle.
- E At the top of The Slopes, stands the imposing Town Hall, designed by William Pollard in 1889.
- F The Museum and Art Gallery (p33) has, since 1928, occupied part of the former Peak Hydropathic Hotel. There is a permanent gallery enhanced throughout the year by exhibitions, workshops and events.

The Green Man Gallery (p21) is within Hardwick Hall, an extension to the Peak Hydropathic Hotel with a Victorian sprung dance floor built in 1896. The venue now has a varied programme of exhibitions, workshops, arts events and live music.

G The Market Place, at 1032 feet above sea level, officially the highest in England, is ringed by some of the older buildings of the town which make up the Higher Buxton shopping area. It has an open market every Saturday and Tuesday (p48). Here you will also find a variety of pubs, restaurants, wine bars and clubs.

The Market Cross, relocated in 1813 to mark the Royal Charter awarded to Buxton Market, is situated on the Town Hall Piazza.

- H A walk down High Street will bring you to St Anne's Church, thought to be the oldest building in the town, just off Bath Road. A walk down the High Street, turning left at Fiveways, leads to St Mary's Church, a fine example of an Arts and Crafts building, built in 1914.
  - At the bottom of Hall Bank, an elegant line of town houses dating from the 1790s, you come on to Broad Walk, a fashionable terrace of houses designed by a variety of prominent architects from the 1860s to the 1880s.

The Pavilion Gardens (p31), designed by Edward Milner and opened in 1871 on 23 acres of land given by the 7th Duke of Devonshire, were restored to the original layout in 2000. Here, along the banks of the River Wye, are the imposing bandstand, the 'Snail Back' garden, miniature railway and lakes filled with a variety of water birds and the six-metre fountain.

J The Pavilion Gardens Complex, originally the Winter Gardens, now houses a tearoom, ice-cream parlour, conservatory and shop. The Pavilion Arts Centre, restored to its former glory, re-opened as a flexible performance and conference venue in 2010. The Pavilion is also home to Buxton Cinema (p30) and the Gallery in the Gardens.

The Octagon, designed by Robert Rippon Duke, was opened in 1876 and recently restored. It now houses a variety of fairs, auctions, concerts and events. Next door is the Swimming Pool & Fitness Centre.

K Buxton Opera House (p30), designed by Frank Matcham, was opened in 1903 and restored in 1979. One of the finest provincial theatres, it presents a varied programme of music, drama, comedy and dance throughout the year.

Opposite Buxton Opera House you will see an original 'Penfold' Victorian Post Box installed in 1867 and is one of only a few still in use.

- St John's Church was designed by John White & Son in 1811 in a neoclassical 'Tuscan' style. The church is not only a place of worship, but also home to the Buxton Musical Society (p34). The designers were also responsible for the colonnaded town houses in The Square.
- M Dominating the Buxton skyline is the Devonshire Dome, home of Buxton & Leek College. The Dome, with a diameter of 46 metres, built by Robert Rippon Duke in 1882 for the Royal Devonshire Hospital, sits on the original building by John Carr which housed the horses and servants of the guests of the Crescent hotels. The general public are welcome inside when not closed for private events. Call ahead to avoid disappointment.
- N Next door to the Dome is the imposing Palace Hotel (p43). Completed in 1868, it was one of a number of grand hotels built for the numerous spa visitors.

- O The great Fan Window, designed by Joseph Paxton is one of the two fan windows which stood at the end of the two railway stations, one of which is now demolished.
- P The fifth Duke of Devonshire built The Old Court House which now houses a variety of restaurants and cafes.
- Q The oldest building in Lower Buxton is part of The Old Hall Hotel (p46). It was originally built by the 6th Earl of Shrewsbury and housed the captive Mary, Queen of Scots, who visited a number of times between 1573 and 1584 to take the waters.
- R Just outside the town centre, is Poole's Cavern, one of the seven Wonders of the Peak, extending for over 300 metres into the limestone of the hillside above the town. Visited by prehistoric cave dwellers. Celtic and Roman visitors, medieval outlaws and Elizabethan royalty, Poole's Cavern (p32) has a wealth of history and legend as well as spectacular stalactite formations. Conducted tours are available all year round. Together with Go Apel, an aerial forest adventure through the trees of the Country Park. or a walk up to Solomon's Temple, there is much to do and see.
- S The Victorian circular Devonshire Park estate, like other parts of Buxton, was laid out by Joseph Paxton. In the middle is the cricket ground, ringed by houses of varied architectural styles including a former residence of Vera Brittain and the Lee Wood Hotel.



Buxton is a wonderful place for a wedding, with its picturesque gardens, historic buildings, atmospheric hotels and a range of venues for you to design your perfect day.

### **Ceremony Venues**

In addition to the numerous churches in the town, there are many licensed venues available for wedding ceremonies for a range of congregation sizes.

In the **Pavilion Gardens** (p31), the colourful, scented, Victorian Winter Garden Conservatory and Don Redfern Memorial Bandstand, and grand Octagon Hall offer truly unique settings for civil ceremonies and evening receptions.



The Palace Hotel (p43) offers ceremonies in its Chatsworth, Cavendish and High Peak suites and photo opportunities within the hotel and there is the Conservatory and the Pendennis Suite at the Lee Wood Hotel.

Or why not celebrate under the impressive **Devonshire Dome**, the largest unsupported dome of its kind in Europe. There is probably no larger or more spectacular venue for your wedding in the region. Or spend your day at the historic Old Hall Hotel's (p46) Garden Room Restaurant or a choose one of the seven rooms at the Crescent Hotel including the stunning Assembly Rooms.


